

ORGANIZATIONAL SUMMARY: The College of Behavioral and Community Sciences prepares students to improve the quality of life, health and safety of diverse populations. The Department of Criminology was established in 1972, and began offering Master's degrees in 1974. In 1998, it became the second department in the State of Florida to offer the PhD degree in Criminology. A study published in the Journal of Criminal Justice Education, ranked USF Criminology faculty as seventh in the nation for scholarly research. The faculty consists of well-respected researchers who have contributed to the study of macro and micro-level models of criminal behavior, victimology, race, violence, juvenile justice, corrections and radical and green criminology. POSITION SUMMARY: The Assistant Professor will be responsible for teaching undergraduate and graduate courses in criminology, both online and in person. Opportunities to teach on the St. Petersburg and Tampa campuses may exist, including teaching within the doctoral program. In keeping with the university's standing as a preeminent, research-intensive institution, the assistant professor will be expected to maintain a consistently high level of scholarly productivity, which may include collaboration with colleagues as well as undergraduate and graduate students. The successful candidate will also be expected to contribute to the operational needs of the department, college and university, as well as the discipline and larger community. The standard teaching load for tenured and tenure-earning faculty is 2-2.

POSITION QUALIFICATIONS:

MINIMUM:

1. Ph.D. in Criminology or closely related field; J.D degrees are not acceptable. Degree must be completed by August 2022.
2. Evidence of teaching at the university level
3. Evidence of publication record

PREFERRED:

1. Evidence of effective teaching at the university level
2. Evidence of strong or promising publication record
3. Experience teaching online
4. Evidence of ability to secure external funding
5. Expertise in cybercrime
6. Strong consideration for secondary expertise in victimology, crime prevention, and/or terrorism/political crime
